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- 1 CHMN. CHENAL: Let's go on the record.
- 2 This is the time set for the prefiling
- conference in the Invenergy project. 3
- 4 May I have appearances, please, starting with
- you, Mr. Acken. 5
- MR. ACKEN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. This is 6
- Bert Acken of Dickinson Wright on behalf of the 7
- 8 applicant, which will be Hashknife Energy Center, LLC,
- 9 which is a wholly owned subsidiary of Invenergy, LLC.
- 10 With me today is Susan Innis, project manager
- 11 for Invenergy and for this project, and Randall Simpson,
- 12 who is the project manager for Burns & McDonnell, the
- 13 consulting group that has been assisting with the CEC
- 14 application.
- 15 CHMN. CHENAL: All right. Thank you very much.
- 16 Ms. Benally, would you like to enter an
- 17 appearance and explain who is with you today, please.
- 18 You are on mute.
- MS. BENALLY: Thank you, Chairman Chenal. 19
- This is Linda Benally. I am representing 20
- 21 Arizona Public Service Company today. APS has a portion
- 22 of the CEC, pardon me, a portion of the project that
- 23 will be an interconnection. And it's for that reason
- 24 that we are attending the conference.
- 25 I have with me today Jason Spitzkoff, who is the

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- transmission planning and interconnections manager. 1
- 2 Brad Larsen is also joining us, and he is the line
- siting consultant who will be advising in this area 3
- relative to the project. And Anna Chaulk is with the 4
- 5 state regulatory department at APS.
- 6 Thank you.
- CHMN. CHENAL: All right. Thank you very much. 7
- 8 And, Mr. Arias, I am going to say Arias, Arias.
- 9 What is the pronunciation?
- 10 MR. ARIAS: Arias.
- 11 CHMN. CHENAL: Arias, that's what I thought.
- 12 Mr. Arias, would you just --
- 13 MR. ARIAS: Mr. Chairman, Antonio Arias on
- 14 behalf of the Utilities Commission Staff, Utilities
- 15 Division.
- 16 CHMN. CHENAL: Okay, thank you.
- 17 MR. ARIAS: Thank you.
- 18 CHMN. CHENAL: Thank you very much.
- 19 And with me is Marie Cobb, the brains of this
- outfit. 20
- 21 So, and I am going to tell you right now I am
- 22 going to be probably referring to you by first name.
- 23 And that's just, you know, it is going to be a lot
- 24 easier. We don't have the fancy cards up like we have
- at some of these hearing. And I can see your names 25

- here, but I just -- that's probably what we will do. 1
- 2 So my understanding is this is, the attempt
- here, and some of this is late-breaking, is that there 3
- 4 is intended to be a single application but two CECs
- 5 because of the nature of this project, both to go to
- Invenergy, the applicant, but then, subsequent to, you 6
- know, issuance of the CEC and on approval of the 7
- 8 Corporation Commission, the intent is to assign one of
- 9 those CECs to APS.
- 10 So, Mr. Acken, if you want to kind of give a
- 11 project overview, and then we will get into some of the
- 12 questions I have and go through my checklist.
- 13 MR. ACKEN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- 14 For the project overview, I suggest that we all
- look at Prefiling Exhibit No. 1. 15
- 16 Thank you, Ms. Cobb, for marking those for us.
- 17 I am going to turn it over to Ms. Innis to go
- over the project facilities and describe it. 18
- 19 mentioned, it is our current plan to file one CEC
- application for this gen-tie project, which will 20
- 21 interconnect to Hashknife Energy Center solar project to
- 22 the regional grid at the Cholla substation.
- 23 We are planning to request two CECs in order to
- 24 facilitate ownership differences for the portion of the
- gen-tie project up to approximately the existing 25

- substation boundary. And then from the substation 1
- 2 boundary internal to the interconnection, you know, will
- 3 likely be owned by APS. So that is why Hashknife Energy
- 4 will be requesting two CECs, to facilitate the
- 5 subsequent assignment of a portion of the gen-tie
- 6 project.
- With that, Ms. Innis, if you would, with using 7
- 8 Prefiling Exhibit 1, provide just a high-level summary
- 9 of the project.
- 10 MS. INNIS: Sure.
- 11 Do you guys mind if I share my screen so we can
- all --12
- 13 CHMN. CHENAL: No. But before you do that,
- 14 Susan, let me just -- there are three exhibits,
- Prefiling Exhibits 1, 2, and 3. They are already 15
- 16 premarked for identification. And they will be just
- 17 made a part of the transcript.
- 18 So please proceed.
- 19 MS. INNIS: Thank you, Chairman. I'll go ahead
- and pull up this map so I can walk you through it. 20
- 21 The Hashknife Energy Center is a solar plus
- 22 storage project proposed in Navajo County just south of
- 23 the Town of Joseph City and very close to the existing
- 24 Cholla energy plant.
- 25 Let me just orient you to this project area map.

- You have got it Exhibit 1. Inside the yellow boundary 1
- 2 is the solar project area. And then through this CEC
- application request for two CECs, we are looking at a 3
- 4 preferred transmission line route for our 500kV tie line
- 5 that's shown in blue here. These numbers show the
- distances, one mile, two miles, three miles. And then 6
- the point of ownership change would be just outside the 7
- 8 APS property here outside the Cholla substation.
- 9 We are also including in our application a
- second alternative route shown here in orange. This is 10
- 11 slightly longer but parallels existing transmission
- 12 facilities to get into the same point of interconnection
- 13 here.
- 14 We have been through the Navajo County
- permitting process. We obtained the special use permit 15
- 16 for this facility last year.
- 17 In terms of public interest and opposition, I
- can tell you the folks in Navajo County, it won't be any 18
- 19 surprise to you guys as owner/operators of the Cholla
- power plant, they are very excited about the potential 20
- 21 for new economic development in the area.
- 22 So in terms of participation in the public
- hearings that the county held, we really only had the 23
- 24 landowner, Aztec Land and Cattle, and the current
- grazing lessee, a gentleman named JR DeSpain. 25

- grazing lessee is opposed to the project because this 1
- 2 will impact his ability to use the land for grazing.
- But the landowner assured us they have other property 3
- they are going to move him to. So he will be kept whole 4
- if the solar project moves forward. 5
- CHMN. CHENAL: Susan, can I interrupt you? Is 6
- the grazing lessee, is he opposed -- he is opposed to 7
- 8 the route depicted in blue, is that correct?
- 9 MS. INNIS: He is opposed to the entire solar
- project. We don't expect he is going to be an 10
- 11 intervenor in this case.
- 12 CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. But as between the two
- 13 routes, the route depicted in blue and the route
- 14 depicted in orange, does this person have a preference
- 15 either way or is he just opposed to the project
- 16 entirely.
- 17 MS. INNIS: That's a good question. Thanks for
- asking me to clarify it. 18
- 19 I believe he is opposed to the project in its
- entirety. He does live adjacent to the alternative 20
- 21 route we show here in orange. So if we were to move
- 22 forward with the blue route, or preferred alternative
- 23 here on the north side, that would be farther away from
- 24 his current home.
- CHMN. CHENAL: All right. Thank you. Thank 25

- 1 you.
- 2 MS. INNIS: Let's see. The only other thing I
- wanted to mention, we have done outreach on the project 3
- as part of our special use permit. And for our CEC 4
- 5 application, we have -- we will be including a number of
- Exhibit H letters to interested parties. 6
- Union Pacific Railroad runs through here. We 7
- 8 have reached out to them a couple times to no avail.
- 9 There is also a State parcel on the western edge
- of the solar project that's not impacted by the 10
- 11 transmission line routes, but we are keeping the Arizona
- 12 State Land Department informed of our activities.
- 13 you will see a letter reach out to them and keeping them
- 14 up to speed on the CEC application we will be filing.
- 15 CHMN. CHENAL: Very good.
- 16 MS. INNIS: The only other thing I would mention
- 17 is we do have an existing LGIA with Arizona Public
- Service for our position Q 230. So --18
- CHMN. CHENAL: LGIA, just for the record. 19
- 20 MS. INNIS: Sorry, large generator
- 21 interconnection agreement.
- 22 And that was Q position 230. And so that
- 23 document generally describes the facilities that
- 24 Invenergy, as the interconnection customer, and APS, as
- the transmission provider, would build to facilitate 25

- 1 interconnection of this solar and storage energy
- 2 project.
- I will go ahead and stop there, and happy to 3
- 4 entertain any questions.
- CHMN. CHENAL: Could you describe generally what 5
- the solar facilities will look like. 6
- MS. INNIS: Yes. This is an up to 400 megawatt 7
- 8 solar photovoltaic facility. We anticipate it will take
- 9 up most of the footprint in this area.
- 10 Pretty typical for the solar installations you
- 11 all have seen around the state, we are using bifacial
- 12 panels on most our projects now. So we have got a
- 13 little extra energy boost having PV cells both on the
- 14 surface of the solar panels that face the sun and also
- catching some of the albedo effect of the bounce back 15
- 16 off the earth on the inner side of the panels.
- 17 CHMN. CHENAL: And what will -- will there be
- storage facilities, battery storage facilities as well 18
- 19 associated with the project?
- MS. INNIS: Yep. For most of our projects these 20
- 21 days we are including a battery storage component mostly
- 22 to help smooth out the integration of that solar
- 23 production from the hot, sunny afternoons into the
- 24 evening hours. So we haven't engineered all the details
- for this particular system, but we would be looking at 25

- 1 including some sort of storage capacity to smooth out
- 2 the energy production.
- CHMN. CHENAL: All right, very good. 3
- 4 when we have had the wind generation project, it wasn't
- obviously part of the application, nor will of course 5
- the solar aspect here. But I think the Committee is 6
- interested in knowing about the generation aspects here 7
- because they certainly were in the other case. 8
- 9 think, you know, some testimony or some discussion of
- that would be appreciated. 10
- 11 MS. INNIS: Great. We will be sure to do that.
- 12 CHMN. CHENAL: Thank you.
- 13 I didn't have any further questions.
- 14 Oh, the interconnection facilities, that's not
- 15 part of this application, is it, or is it? I should ask
- 16 that question. I think you mentioned there is going to
- 17 be some interconnection facilities.
- MR. ACKEN: Mr. Chairman, so, yes, there will --18
- 19 (Technical difficulties ensued.)
- 20 CHMN. CHENAL: Frozen. He's frozen in space, in
- 21 time.
- 22 MS. INNIS: There he is.
- 23 MR. ACKEN: If I go off -- can you hear me if I
- 24 go off of video?
- 25 (Technical difficulties ensued.)

- (An off-the-record discussion ensued.) 1
- 2 CHMN. CHENAL: So, Susan, if you would --
- Go back on the record. We had a little 3
- technical snafu, but we are back on, ready to go so. 4
- Susan, if you would be kind enough, I had a 5
- question about the interconnection facilities, whether 6
- that's going to be part of the application. Because 7
- 8 part of those are located and --
- 9 MS. INNIS: Yeah. Burt, you were starting to
- answer that when you broke up. Do you want to give your 10
- 11 full answer there?
- MR. ACKEN: Sure. So on the interconnection 12
- 13 facilities, we are requesting approval for the
- 14 interconnection at the project site. There will be a
- 15 substation, a step up to the 500kV. So that substation
- 16 is part of the requested approval. It is within the
- 17 footprint of the solar project.
- And then the interconnection facilities into the 18
- 19 existing Cholla substation, and perhaps APS, you know,
- can chime in as well, but we are really talking about 20
- the line into the substation, the substation itself, my 21
- 22 understanding, predates CEC jurisdiction. So the Cholla
- 23 substation will not require authorization, just the line
- 24 into those, into the facility.
- 25 CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. I think that's an

- unresolved issue that we really haven't decided. I know 1
- 2 some applicants believe substations are required to be
- part and some take the position they aren't. And I 3
- honestly have not taken -- drawn a position on that. 4 As
- long as the information is depicted in the -- and I 5
- don't think the Corporation Commission has either. And 6
- I know there are different schools of thought on it. 7
- 8 But I think as long as -- but I think it is important
- 9 that the facilities be depicted and discussed in the
- application so we have the full context of the project. 10
- 11 I think that's important.
- 12 So are there any questions on that? All right.
- 13 MR. ACKEN: Understood.
- 14 CHMN. CHENAL: So, okay?
- 15 So let's go through my checklist at this point.
- 16 And I think some of these questions have been answered.
- 17 Possible intervenors, your assumption at this point is
- 18 there will not be intervenors in the project, is that
- 19 correct?
- MR. ACKEN: Mr. Chairman, APS will be an 20
- 21 intervenor. They will be in an intervenor role.
- 22 defer to Antonio whether he anticipates that Staff will
- 23 also intervene. We are not anticipating any other
- 24 intervenors than that.
- 25 CHMN. CHENAL: Antonio, you are not bound by it,

- but do you believe you will be intervening in this? 1
- 2 MR. ARIAS: At this time I think we are just
- waiting to see the application, and then we will be able 3
- 4 to make that decision.
- CHMN. CHENAL: Fair enough.
- And I, of course, assumed that APS is going to 6
- be an intervenor. I should have mentioned that. 7
- 8 okay, so...
- 9 And I think it was already discussed the public
- interest is, you know, there is some support for it. 10
- 11 There may be one gentleman who is opposed it. But I
- 12 quess in a very general sense, is it fair to say this is
- 13 not the controversial project where we can expect a lot
- 14 of public input that would be opposed to this project?
- Is that a fair statement? 15
- 16 MR. ACKEN: Mr. Chairman, yes, that's our
- 17 expectation. Susan could talk more about the Navajo
- process. But, you know, we are talking about a 18
- 19 transmission line in an area close to other transmission
- lines, the support of the owner of the property, a solar 20
- 21 field with, even though it is not part of the
- 22 application itself, you know, has certainly minimal
- 23 visual impacts to surrounding areas that would be of
- 24 concern like some other projects. And as Susan
- mentioned, this is an area that is looking for 25

- development such as this to offset some of their losses. 1
- 2 So no, we are not anticipating a lot of opposition.
- Okay. Very good. 3 CHMN. CHENAL:
- All right. So we have discussed the project in 4
- some, you know, in some general terms, and we have, you 5
- know, Exhibit 1 that depicts the map. Let's discuss the 6
- notice of this hearing, you know, posting and 7
- 8 publishing.
- 9 We have a Draft Notice of Hearing, which is
- Prefiling Exhibit No. 2. And I don't remember, Bert, is 10
- 11 this what you drafted, or, Marie, did you draft this?
- MR. ACKEN: We drafted this after our 12
- 13 preliminary prefiling conference and sent this to Marie
- 14 at the end of last week.
- It is certainly tailored off of a typical notice 15
- 16 of hearing. There are a couple differences from what
- 17 you typically see. The first one, of course, is the
- 18 reference, you know, it says we are dealing with the
- 19 COVID situation and encouraging people to attend
- remotely and making sure, though, that there are options 20
- 21 and availability for the public to participate in a
- variety of forums. So that's different than what you 22
- 23 would see normally.
- Another distinction is we are not proposing to 24
- make the application available in any public locations. 25

- Typically we would provide the application at ACC 1
- 2 Dockets and nearby libraries. ACC Dockets is not open
- to the public. And the libraries that we reached out to 3
- were either not open or not enthused about holding onto 4
- 5 a document that someone could come in and just review at
- their leisure. So we are proposing instead to make the 6
- application available online and then, for folks that 7
- 8 may not have access to the online version, that we will
- 9 provide a phone number for Susan's number and make a
- 10 commitment that we will provide hard copy applications
- 11 to anybody who needs them.
- Those are kind of the key differences from what 12
- 13 you would typically see, but otherwise, you know, it is
- 14 a typical notice.
- Oh, there is a third item. We did remove the 15
- reference to a tour based on our earlier discussions 16
- 17 with the expectation that it would be difficult, if not
- impossible, to do a tour and maintain the social 18
- 19 distancing protocols and other protections that would be
- needed at this time. 20
- CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. Yeah, I have looked at 21
- this generally. I think it is, it is good. 22
- 23 Now, on page 2, line 23, there is a reference to
- 24 the project website. But is that website noted
- anywhere? Is there a link to a notice of hearing? 25

- MR. ACKEN: It is on, it is referenced the first 1
- 2 time on page 2, line 1. It is not showing as a
- hyperlink for some reason. That hashknifesolar.com is 3
- 4 the project website. And Susan may know whether that is
- 5 live yet. It certainly will be by the time the
- 6 application is filed.
- CHMN. CHENAL: Good. You are right. I am 7
- 8 looking for the blue, you know, link and I didn't see
- 9 it. But you are right, it is at line 1. Okay, very
- 10 good.
- 11 The other, then, was do we want to put in some
- 12 language about the COVID safety protocols, masks, in
- 13 terms of the public hearing itself. You know, we talk
- 14 about encouraging the public to participate by watching
- 15 or listening rather than attending in person. But if
- 16 they do attend in person, do we want to put in some --
- 17 address that -- I will certainly do that in the
- procedural order, but, you know, those attend -- you 18
- 19 know, something like those attending in person are
- required to social distance and wear masks, you know, 20
- 21 some language that at least addresses that?
- 22 MR. ACKEN: We certainly could do that. I don't
- 23 think that the suggestions or requirements, depending on
- 24 whether they are requirements or suggestions at that
- time, to socially distance and wear masks will be 25

- 1 different than they are today.
- 2 Another option we could do, we could say, you
- know, attendees, members of the public who plan to 3
- 4 attend in person to be aware that there will be safety
- 5 protocols such as X, Y, and Z, and that that will be
- 6 identified on the open meeting agenda. So that way it
- gives us a little more flexibility with timing as to 7
- 8 what requirements may be at that time, depending on what
- 9 is going on in Coconino County at that time.
- 10 CHMN. CHENAL: That makes sense, Bert.
- 11 makes sense. I would ask you if you could draft some
- 12 language and get it over to us. I think that makes some
- 13 sense.
- 14 Certainly if you have any thoughts on that as
- 15 well, or APS, I mean, you know, I view this hearing as a
- group effort to get it right. And I just feel like, you 16
- 17 know, the more, the more we discuss it and have a
- consensus the better. So I am certainly not taking 18
- 19 ownership -- I will take ownership of it, but I
- certainly appreciate everyone's input to make it as best 20
- 21 as, you know, we can make it. So I would appreciate any
- 22 input that's important to put together on the language
- 23 of these documents to get it right.
- 24 So, Bert, if you would be kind enough to maybe
- shoot it to everybody, you know, APS, obviously myself, 25

- and Antonio, you know, I would appreciate it. 1
- 2 MR. ACKEN: Will do.
- CHMN. CHENAL: So I mean everything else looks 3
- good. 4
- Now, if I am the public and I want to call in, 5
- how do I do that? 6
- MR. ACKEN: We don't have that on the notice of 7
- 8 hearing. Again, we are not in a position today to
- 9 provide that information. And, frankly, we had some
- 10 concerns about publishing that in a newspaper. It may
- 11 be having folks bomb it who are bored.
- 12 So our thought was, again, information like that
- 13 will be made available on the website. It would be on
- 14 the open meeting agenda. And it could be obtained by
- 15 calling Susan. So that again gives us more flexibility
- 16 as we approach the hearing to say what are our options,
- 17 what platform are we going to use, and things of that
- nature to make sure that we provide options that are 18
- 19 going to work for the public. And I just didn't feel
- comfortable putting it in a newspaper paper publication, 20
- 21 thinking that what happens if we need to change. I
- 22 would rather give us the flexibility today and make it
- 23 clear to the public how they can get that information
- 24 than put it in here now.
- CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. And I agree with that. 25 Т

- just wanted to have a little discussion. 1
- 2 The language is clear. It does say, you know,
- after the bold language: The public is strongly 3
- 4 encouraged to participate by either watching or
- 5 listening.
- The following sentence says: At least 24 hours 6
- in advance of the hearing, information regarding online 7
- 8 and telephone hearing access will be posted on the
- 9 project website at, the website, and available by
- calling Susan, and the number, which is Susan's number. 10
- 11 I think that makes sense under the circumstances.
- 12 MR. ACKEN: Yeah. And I would anticipate it
- 13 will also be on the open meeting notice. I mean we
- 14 don't say that here but it makes sense to include that
- 15 on the open meeting notice as well.
- CHMN. CHENAL: Yeah, the agenda, right. Is 16
- 17 that --
- 18 MR. ACKEN: Yes, the open meeting agenda.
- 19 CHMN. CHENAL: So, okay, that's very good.
- 20 me get back to where my --
- 21 So I think, yeah, with the additional language
- 22 on maybe what we talked about with safety protocols, I
- 23 think the notice of hearing will be fine.
- 24 And then let's talk about publication of the
- notice of hearing. Where do you intend to publish? 25

- MR. ACKEN: Mr. Chairman, I am going to turn 1
- 2 that over to Randy to discuss the publication plan.
- Yeah. Right now, there are three 3 MR. SIMPSON:
- newspapers that we intend to notice the hearings. 4
- 5 that includes the Arizona Republic, which obviously is
- the statewide newspaper; Arizona Daily Sun, which is 6
- based in Flagstaff, and that's a regional newspaper that 7
- 8 serves that area; and then we have the local newspaper,
- 9 the Holbrook Tribune, which is obviously in Holbrook,
- which is the county seat. We have been working with 10
- 11 them closely. So I think that is a pretty good range of
- 12 notices.
- 13 And each of them have slightly different
- 14 deadlines in terms of getting the information in to
- 15 them. For publishing, what it looks right now is, if we
- 16 are successful getting the application submitted, and we
- 17 would want to probably notice it, it looks like,
- October 15th, because some of these newspapers only do 18
- 19 this once a week, so the Thursday seems to be kind of
- the most limiting factor, and that's with the Holbrook 20
- 21 Tribune. But if we do that and we plan around that
- 22 15th, I believe that meets that 10-day window and then
- 23 puts us right, you know, in that 30-day range prior to
- 24 hearing roughly. So, you know, if we do that and tried
- to shoot for that day, I believe we could meet all the 25

- deadlines. And we would need to get information to 1
- 2 those newspapers between October 9th and October 14th
- and we are going to hit that date. So that's kind of 3
- 4 our windows that we are working with.
- CHMN. CHENAL: And what is your anticipated 5
- 6 filing date?
- MR. ACKEN: Well, with that in mind, we are 7
- looking at probably the 8th. And the 8th would be as 8
- 9 late as I would want to push it, because, as you know,
- we have limitations at ACC Dockets. 10
- 11 And, Antonio, maybe that's something that, you
- 12 know, you can help us navigate as well. I would
- 13 certainly welcome any guidance or assistance there since
- 14 we have to provide witnesses in an in-person filing with
- a limited window. 15
- So we are thinking, if we file on the 8th, 16
- 17 Mr. Chairman, that gives you the 9th to file in that
- narrow window the notice of hearing in order to make 18
- 19 that publication deadline. So that's what we are
- 20 looking at.
- 21 CHMN. CHENAL: And we will be able to do that, I
- 22 think. Get your draft, you know, say Monday sometime,
- 23 we can take a look at it and make sure it is, the notice
- 24 of hearing is ready to go. Because that's what you will
- need back right away. And we can do that. 25

- Right, Marie? 1
- 2 MR. SIMPSON: Yeah, I think that's pretty
- critical. We are, you know, again, just making sure 3
- 4 this fits within the legal requirements, but if we want
- 5 to kind of target that 15th for publication in the
- newspapers, that does mean that we would have to have 6
- that notice submitted to the Holbrook Tribune on 7
- 8 October 9th. So that's a pretty critical deadline, I
- 9 think. Otherwise, since it is a weekly newspaper, we go
- a full other week, and then that would push all the way, 10
- 11 I guess, back to, what, the 15th or something.
- 12 CHMN. CHENAL: Well, I just need to see a little
- 13 more language on the notice of hearing, I mean not much,
- 14 just what we talked about. And, you know, I think the
- 15 rest of it looks good to me.
- 16 So, you know, we can turn that around pretty
- 17 quickly, I mean very quickly. And then as soon as you
- 18 file it, well, we can turn it around in the sense we
- 19 will have it ready to go, and when you file, we can
- pretty much, you know, immediately get it, get it filed 20
- 21 with the Corporation Commission in the docket.
- 22 I guess we just need a heads up as to when you
- 23 are actually going to file it so we can immediately
- 24 then, you know, turn around and get the notice of
- hearing filed and back. 25

- So if you want to do it before the 8th, that's 1
- 2 fine, the 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th. So I
- 3 mean we will finalize the language Monday, the 5th.
- 4 after that, you know, we are just waiting. So, you
- 5 know, if you want to file the 6th or the 7th, we will go
- ahead and then get the notice of hearing back to you. 6
- No use waiting until the 9th. Murphy's law, when you do 7
- 8 that, something bad is going to happen. So if you want
- do it more quickly, we can accommodate that. 9
- 10 MR. ACKEN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- 11 giving you the date that is kind of our outside date.
- 12 Obviously I hope that we can do it sooner than that.
- 13 But the logistics of finalizing the application,
- 14 printing, review, it may end up being on the 8th as kind
- 15 of a worst case.
- And we will certainly coordinate with Dockets as 16
- 17 well to make sure that we know when someone will be
- available to stamp it and docket it at that same time, 18
- 19 and that they know that both the applications as well as
- your notice of hearing will be coming so that at least 20
- 21 we hope that we can have that aligned and coordinated
- 22 with them.
- 23 CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. That sounds good.
- 24 goal, my goal with Marie will be that we will, we will
- have a final version of the notice of hearing by the end 25

- of Monday. Okay? And then we will stand by to wait to 1
- 2 hear.
- Let's talk about the signs and the location. 3
- 4 Randy, is that Exhibit, Prefiling Exhibit No. 3?
- 5 that the signage?
- MR. SIMPSON: I will just pull that up here real 6
- 7 quick so I can speak towards it, but...
- 8 MR. ACKEN: And, yes, that's Prefiling No. 3.
- MR. SIMPSON: Yeah. So we have proposed two 9
- locations for the signs and then an alternate location. 10
- 11 The locations were selected largely because this Obed
- 12 Road is really the only way you can access the project
- 13 site. And then you have McLaws or Territorial Road that
- 14 runs east-west, and that connects between Holbrook and
- 15 Winslow. So you do get a little bit of traffic.
- My personal observation is, having been out 16
- 17 there a number of times, most people seem to come from
- the north heading south. I am not sure which direction 18
- 19 they go from there. But most of the traffic I observed
- was on Obed Road. 20
- 21 So the locations that we have, you know, what we
- 22 are trying to do is, you know, find convenient locations
- 23 where, you know, they are reasonably close to the
- 24 alternatives we are proposing but also areas that they
- could actually pull off the road and review the signs 25

- and do that in a safe way. 1
- 2 This road is fairly narrow itself.
- particular location at the southwest corner of this 3
- 4 intersection of Obed Road, and then there is a two-track
- road that leads east and west, has a shoulder to pull 5
- 6 off on as well as an approach that leads to a gate. So
- I feel like that is a fairly safe location. It actually 7
- 8 is pretty much in line with the preferred alternative.
- 9 So I think that's one of the better locations.
- 10 The next location was down at the
- 11 interconnection of Obed and McLaws-Territorial Road.
- 12 Again, I think it captures most of the traffic that
- 13 would be entering, you know, from, you know, any given
- 14 direction. And there is also a little bit more of a
- 15 shoulder. It is not as good as this location but you
- 16 can pull off to the side of the road and get out of your
- 17 car and look at this sign in this location.
- There is actually across the road, you would 18
- 19 have to walk across the intersection, there is a really
- good area to pull off over there if somebody is 20
- 21 concerned about pulling off on the shoulder. But, you
- 22 know, this puts the location, I think, on the major
- 23 property owner's land as well so that the -- Aztec Land
- 24 owns most of this property. So it gets it situated, you
- know, relative to the solar plant as well as the 25

- alternative, the transmission line alternatives. 1
- 2 There was another location that we potentially
- There is a communications facility that is 3
- located here. We didn't feel like that one is quite as 4
- good because it is not particularly any closer to the 5
- actual alternative, but it seems to be kind of floating 6
- out in no man's land here. So we felt like this was a 7
- 8 better option because you at least get traffic going all
- 9 directions here. But we wouldn't be opposed to that
- location if somebody felt better about. 10
- 11 There is really no other way to get out into the
- 12 project area. This area is all fenced off and gated and
- 13 locked up. So without having landowner access, there is
- 14 really no way to get to any signs other than these
- locations. So I feel like that's the best option. 15
- 16 CHMN. CHENAL: I like the green locations you
- 17 note there, the ones you proposed.
- 18 MR. SIMPSON: Yeah.
- CHMN. CHENAL: I mean I don't know if there is 19
- 20 any east-west traffic on McLaws that would go, you know,
- 21 go east or west of Obed that would at least see the sign
- 22 and know about the project. So if you placed it north
- 23 of McLaws, you know, you missed that east-west traffic.
- 24 Someone would have to turn right on Obed and go up in
- order to see the sign. So I kind of like the green --25

- MR. SIMPSON: Yeah, that's what we are thinking. 1
- 2 You do get traffic. This McLaws-Territorial actually
- connects Holbrook to Winslow. So there is probably some 3
- rural traffic that moves there. I didn't see as many 4
- vehicles using that. But, again, my observation was 5
- just a few different days out there, so it may get more 6
- uses different times of the day. So I think it is the 7
- 8 best way to get it posted and more obviously located.
- 9 CHMN. CHENAL: Good. I think that's great. I
- think that's great. I think that will work just fine. 10
- 11 Let's review quickly the affected jurisdictions
- 12 What are the affected jurisdictions? We talked again.
- 13 about this informally when we met once before but just
- 14 to get it on the record. Bert.
- 15 MR. ACKEN: It will be -- excuse me. It will be
- 16 Navajo County. And then we will also include State
- Land. As you see on the, on that Prefiling Exhibit 3, 17
- even though the project itself doesn't cross state land, 18
- 19 there is state land in the general vicinity. So we will
- send notice to them as well. 20
- 21 CHMN. CHENAL: All right. Let's move on to the
- 22 evidentiary hearing itself. And I mean, just so the
- 23 record is clear, we have met before and discussed some
- 24 of, some of the logistics in this COVID environment.
- And so we talked about basically kind of a hybrid 25

- 1 hearing where some people could appear remotely, like
- 2 the Zoom or some other platform, and others could attend
- 3 in person.
- So, I don't know, Bert or Randy, do you want to 4
- speak if you have better thoughts on how this is going 5
- 6 to come about technology-wise?
- MR. ACKEN: So I can take a swing at that and 7
- 8 then turn it over to Randy for cleanup.
- 9 So we are looking at the High Country Conference
- Center as the location for the actual physical component 10
- 11 of the hearing. You know, that's one the Committee is
- 12 familiar from a variety of hearings that had been held
- 13 there.
- 14 The nice thing about this current time period
- 15 that we have is there is good availability of space.
- 16 And so we can make sure that we are in a hearing room
- 17 that is larger than normal, than which you might
- normally plan on having for a hearing in order to make 18
- 19 sure there is more than adequate social distancing for
- those who do plan to attend in person. 20
- 21 And so our plan would be to make this so that if
- 22 the Committee as a whole, if they end up participating
- 23 in person, there would be plenty of social distancing
- 24 opportunities for them, as well as for the parties and
- the parties' witnesses and the public, should members of 25

- 1 the public attend in person.
- 2 Again, we are envisioning a blended hearing, if
- you will, so that, while we will have an in-person 3
- 4 component, members of the Committee, parties, witnesses,
- 5 and members of the public who either cannot or don't
- feel comfortable coming in person will be able to get 6
- the same experience that those in the room have. And so 7
- 8 we will have some platform, whether it is Teams such as
- 9 this or another one where each individual presenter will
- have a laptop, the presentation that is shown in the 10
- 11 room will also be on the screens for observers online.
- 12 And the intent and the hope and the, certainly the goal
- 13 is to provide those who are watching or participating
- 14 virtually to have the same experience that those in the
- 15 room have.
- I think we are still, as I mentioned earlier, 16
- 17 working out logistics on what that's going to look like.
- 18 As you might expect, there are a few moving projects
- 19 both with the venue, A/V options, and the actual
- platform that we might use for the hearing, so... 20
- 21 that's our intent and that's the goal and that's what we
- 22 are shooting for.
- 23 Randy, did I miss anything?
- 24 MR. SIMPSON: No. That's pretty good.
- think you are right, Bert, things are coming together 25

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- 1 quite well.
- 2 We had another meeting yesterday with the
- conference facilities and we talked about a range of 3
- 4 subjects. One was room space an organization. They do
- 5 have their own COVID protocols that are in place. We
- look to be utilizing the facility that's at least 7,000 6
- square feet, possibly as large as 10,000. I think what 7
- 8 you will find, and we just got a draft of this layout
- 9 worked out yesterday but we need to make a few more
- changes, but we are going to set this up pretty typical 10
- 11 to what you see with the Committee on recent hearings.
- 12 I have attended a few of those, so, you know, we know
- 13 what is needed there.
- 14 And the idea is we will have a dual screen
- 15 format, a fairly large horseshoe shaped setup.
- 16 will have plenty of room for Committee members, counsel,
- 17 and participants. And then we will have a small area in
- the back where we will have sitting for up to 15, maybe 18
- 19 a few more people to attend in person. They do have a
- limit of 50 people right now. So, you know, that could 20
- 21 get to be, you know, right up against the number
- 22 depending on how many people we have from the Committee
- 23 showing up and then the participants. So I think we
- 24 will want to kind of use some caution there when we
- start getting the attendance list ironed out. 25

- But they will set up tables that are individual 1
- 2 size side by each, but they are six foot wide -- or
- So if you have a person sitting between in the 3
- 4 middle each of that table, you will have six feet
- 5 between every one, 50 people maximum. And then, you
- know, we should have some pretty good elbow room. 6
- And we will be working through some logistics on 7
- 8 audiovisual, but we have two different choices there.
- 9 We are working potentially to bring in the folks from
- 10 AzG&T, the Men in Black that have done this a lot. They
- 11 are working to get approval through the COVID protocols
- 12 that they have, but they have expressed interest in
- 13 doing that. And if for some reason that doesn't work
- 14 out, we are supposed to hear for firm next Wednesday, we
- will shift gears and work exclusively with the facility 15
- 16 people at the conference center.
- 17 And they have secured some additional resources
- that I think weren't in place the last time you did a 18
- 19 hearing up there, but they have more audiovisual
- capabilities now. And they have worked to improve that. 20
- 21 They have got a quite nice sound system. We talked
- 22 about the integration of not only the in-person meetings
- 23 but the use of the Zoom platform. They have been
- 24 working through that on some other events they have
- hosted. They seem pretty confident making that work so 25

35

- 1 we don't have any audio issues with, you know, dial-ins
- 2 versus in-person issues. So we are working through
- We think we have a pretty good plan there. 3
- So I think in the last few days things are 4
- coming together quite nicely with the facility. I think 5
- we are going to have the room we need and the technology 6
- we need to pull it off. 7
- 8 CHMN. CHENAL: Great. Sounds encouraging. I
- 9 have the utmost confidence.
- 10 And I have been quick to point out that you guys
- 11 are kind of the guinea pigs here because there will be a
- 12 lot of people looking at how you do it. A few days ago
- 13 I woke up thinking it was just a normal day and got two
- 14 projects, and all of a sudden at the end of the day I
- 15 find out we have five that are going to be heard by the
- 16 Committee probably by the end of January, certainly by
- 17 the beginning of February. So, you know, this is, I
- 18 think, a good learning experience. That's why I think
- it is great we are going to work together to get it 19
- right. So that all sounds very good to me. 20
- 21 Obviously the standard question: Lodging will
- 22 be provide for those Committee members; financial
- arrangements will be made with the Corporation 23
- 24 Commission, Bert, right?
- 25 MR. ACKEN: Yes, that's correct.

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- CHMN. CHENAL: We will not have a tour. But we 1
- 2 would like a robust, you know, flyover, maybe a little
- more than normal. A lot of times these flyovers are, 3
- you know, pretty quick, a minute or so. Maybe a little 4
- more, I mean slow the plane down a little and kind of 5
- let's do a little more complete look of it and at a 6
- little slower speed to kind of get the full picture and 7
- 8 let people appreciate it. I mean some flybys, you know,
- it is faster than a Mooney. Let's take it down to, you 9
- know, slow Piper Cub speeds so we can see everything and 10
- 11 absorb it and understand it as we fly over it.
- 12 Let's -- go ahead.
- 13 MR. SIMPSON: Yeah. With respect to that, one
- 14 of the things that we are going to be doing in addition
- 15 to the flyover is we are going to incorporate some
- 16 static photography, that we have cameras, you know, on
- 17 the ground in the project area. You are going to see
- some of those photos actually in the application when 18
- 19 you receive that. But we are going to incorporate that
- into the video flyover so that it gives you both a sense 20
- of what it looks like, you know, from an overall 21
- 22 perspective, but actually ground level we have got some
- 23 pretty good photos that I think will help a lot.
- 24 CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. All right. Very good.
- 25 Just to go back to the hearing dates, because I

- 2 prehearing conference date, and I know we have it set
- 3 for Monday, November 16th, the 17th, and the 18th as
- necessary, is there any concern that we should go out an 4
- 5 extra day just in case, given Murphy's law? I just, you
- know, I know that, not to -- just to have a little 6
- insurance there, I just always like to have just a 7
- 8 little extra time.
- 9 I mean we don't know, you know, what technology
- snafus there might be. We just don't know. And I would 10
- 11 just feel more comfortable maybe even having the whole
- 12 week, with the idea we are not going to get past
- 13 Wednesday, just in case. And the risk is on the
- 14 applicant there. And APS is kind of the beneficiary of
- 15 the CEC. I just, I throw it out there.
- 16 MR. ACKEN: So, Mr. Chairman, you know, we have
- 17 talked about this several times and the push-pull versus
- paying for additional days that you don't need versus 18
- 19 having that flexibility. You know, and given what I
- dealt with this morning with the technical difficulty, I 20
- 21 mean your point is well taken.
- 22 You know, I look at our template as the hearing
- 23 we held last year at this same location that we got done
- 24 by Wednesday afternoon with a tour that took up most of
- Tuesday. So I think that's a fair amount of flexibility 25

- 1 for technical problems.
- 2 What I don't know is, you know, depending on APS
- and Commission Staff, you know, their involvement. We 3
- 4 did not have any intervenor at that last hearing.
- so that could be -- add some time as well. 5
- Obviously we are going to follow your lead. And 6
- if you think, from a comfort level, it makes sense to 7
- 8 have one extra day, and the worst thing that happens is
- 9 you don't need it, I think that's, you know, that's a
- 10 Susan call. But the alternative is we would have to
- 11 come back later if we don't get it done.
- 12 CHMN. CHENAL: That's what we would have to do.
- 13 And I just have to tell you, with our schedule, we are
- 14 looking at into February before we would be able to
- resume. So I think it makes sense to have an extra day 15
- 16 there and try to cut a deal with the hotel to say if we
- 17 don't need it, we can cancel and we don't have to pay
- 18 for it, or whatever. But I just, just throw that out.
- 19 I'd hate to see us get to Wednesday afternoon and not
- 20 get it completed.
- And this is another thing. I do not like to be 21
- 22 with our Committee struggling to get the deliberations
- 23 and the CEC done in an afternoon. I just -- we have had
- 24 bad experiences with that. I much prefer to start out
- in the morning to do the CEC deliberations and work 25

- through it, which I would anticipate to be Wednesday 1
- 2 morning in this case. But if for any reason we got into
- 3 Wednesday, you know, after lunch, 1:00, 2:00, 3:00, I
- would not want to do the deliberations at that point. 4 Ι
- would want to start the next day. 5
- So just you tell me what you would like. 6
- MS. INNIS: Chairman, Invenergy is happy to add 7
- 8 that Wednesday, I am sorry, to add the extra Thursday.
- So we would have Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday. 9
- I think that's a good insurance policy to make sure we 10
- 11 get everything down and handle any hiccups that might
- 12 happen.
- 13 CHMN. CHENAL: Yeah. And that's really what
- 14 would happen. I agree with Bert 100 percent. This
- 15 would be Monday and Tuesday, no problem; deliberations
- 16 Wednesday morning, you know, get done, you know,
- 17 Wednesday probably, you know. But it is the technology
- snafus. It is, you know, it is the things we can't 18
- 19 anticipate in this crazy environment of ours that might
- throw us off a little. And I would just like to have 20
- 21 the flexibility.
- 22 So, you know, Bert, will you work on the notice
- 23 of hearing? If you could maybe add an extra day there.
- We will do that to the agenda. Where else do we need to 24
- 25 do it? I think that makes sense.

- So let's talk about a date for the prehearing 1
- 2 conference. Maybe we already talked about that, but I
- don't remember what that date is. 3
- 4 MR. ACKEN: I don't think that we have. I will
- pull up my calendar. And obviously if we had discussed 5
- it, we didn't have APS or Commission Staff. So they 6
- might have some restrictions on their availability. 7
- 8 So are you thinking the week of the 9th would be
- 9 the time to hold it?
- 10 CHMN. CHENAL: I think Monday, November 9th,
- 11 might work. Given this environment, I would like to not
- 12 make it too close to the hearing just in case we have to
- 13 work out something and we need another meeting, just --
- 14 you know.
- 15 MR. ACKEN: So that works for the applicant.
- One question I have is, you know, typically when 16
- 17 there are multiple parties, you have the obligation to
- exchange exhibits by the time of the prehearing. And I 18
- am wondering if, you know, parties can agree that maybe 19
- we have a little more flexibility on when we exchange 20
- 21 exhibits if we are making some last-minute changes so
- that we still have that week of the 9th in order to work 22
- 23 on hearing preparation and testimony and exhibits and
- 24 even forms of CEC.
- 25 CHMN. CHENAL: Yeah, I think this -- I think

- that's a given. If you want to do it on -- November 6 1
- 2 is a Friday, we could do it, or the 9th, or even the
- 3 You know, if you want to do it on the 10th we
- 4 could do it. Probably I wouldn't want to go past the
- 5 10th.
- And then, you know, we will -- I will let you 6
- know that we will have a little more flexibility on, you 7
- 8 know, exhibits, witnesses, and forms of CEC given the
- 9 circumstances.
- 10 I will probably still put in the procedural
- 11 order the requirement to exchange, you know, the
- 12 summaries of the testimony and the exhibits and the
- 13 other documents that it normally requires, but I will
- 14 tell you we will allow some flexibility here if there
- have to be changes after that given the circumstances. 15
- So is the 10th, does that make sense? In the 16
- 17 afternoon, 2:00, say on November 10th, 2:00 p.m., does
- 18 that work for people?
- 19 MR. ACKEN: It works for the applicant.
- MS. BENALLY: This is Linda. And it works for 20
- 21 Let me look to Jason. me.
- 22 Okay. Yes, APS is available on November 10th in
- 23 the afternoon.
- 24 CHMN. CHENAL: Antonio, does it work for you?
- MR. ARIAS: Yes, Chairman, it works for Staff. 25

- CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. So let's --1
- 2 MS. COBB: Mr. Chairman, will it be via Zoom as
- 3 well?
- 4 CHMN. CHENAL: Yes.
- MS. COBB: Okay. 5
- 6 CHMN. CHENAL: So, yes, we will do that by Zoom
- as well. 7
- 8 And if we need to talk before then because of
- something that comes up, just let me know and we will 9
- meet. And if we have to meet after November 10th, we 10
- 11 will meet. So just know that we will, we will deal with
- 12 any problems that come up, because I do want to work out
- a good procedure, not only for this hearing, but for 13
- 14 subsequent hearings.
- Okay. I am going to review today the procedural 15
- 16 order and the agenda.
- 17 Marie, do you have time to make a few changes to
- 18 the agenda? You might have to piggyback some language
- out of the notice of hearing into the agenda, and we 19
- won't have that until Monday, you know, or Tuesday, 20
- 21 hopefully Monday. So we might have to amend or change
- 22 the agenda to piggyback onto the notice of hearing.
- 23 I also want to get you the procedural order, and maybe
- 24 that will be Monday, and get input on that.
- 25 I don't -- I have never done that before. And I

- think I mentioned that as well to Tucson Electric and Ed 1
- 2 Beck. He doesn't like a lot of the stuff in the
- procedural order. He doesn't like a lot of conditions. 3
- 4 And I said this is not an opportunity to, you know, try
- 5 to make changes to take stuff away, Ed, this is only to
- add to it or to modify something because of COVID and 6
- the way this hearing is being conducted. 7
- 8 So I would like to do that in this case because,
- 9 again, I want to get the benefit of everyone's thoughts
- 10 so we kind of work on this as a team to get it right.
- 11 So I will do that as well. Marie will do that.
- 12 want to look to it one more time to see if there is
- 13 anything I need to add to the procedural order for the
- 14 COVID. And probably that's going to require some
- language addressing the COVID protocols of some type. 15
- 16 I think -- public comment. We have the hearing
- 17 as we typically do that Monday evening. Normally we
- like to allow people to give their comment during the 18
- 19 hearing when they show up, you know, after a break or
- something so they don't need to stick around the whole 20
- 21 day.
- 22 So I quess this is for Randy. But if someone
- 23 wants to listen or join the meeting either by audio, I
- 24 don't know if there is going to be a video option or
- not, but even by audio, is there a way that they could 25

- signify that they would like to provide public comment, 1
- 2 we could take it out of order during the hearing at some
- 3 point?
- 4 MR. SIMPSON: Yeah. I mean the way the Zoom
- technology works, you can have it set up so there is a 5
- 6 gatekeeper and that anybody that has a question has to,
- you know, technically raise your hand, if you will. And 7
- 8 then the moderator could acknowledge that and then we
- 9 could allow them to do that.
- 10 Of course, if they are remote doing this, you
- 11 know, and they are dialed in the hearing, it should be
- 12 as easy as just admitting them to the meeting and let
- 13 them, you know, give their statements. And we can
- 14 interact appropriately there.
- 15 If they are at the actual facility, then we
- 16 would handle it the same way. We intend to have a
- 17 podium set up where they can approach the podium.
- 18 I think we are going to have to have in that case,
- 19 either we are going to have another computer there that
- they stand in front of so any participants can see them, 20
- 21 or we are going to have a camera that's set up
- 22 situationally where it can observe the entire meeting
- 23 facility so that, you know, again, somebody could make,
- 24 you know, a visual reference to that person so they
- would understand that there is somebody speaking. 25

- We talked with High Country yesterday. And I 1
- 2 don't think -- I don't know that we are going to go this
- 3 far with it, but they said they had a person that they
- 4 could bring in to actually man a camera where, you know,
- 5 the whole day that person would be busy shooting anybody
- that's talking. Specifically they would zoom in on 6
- 7 I don't know if that's what I was envisioning as
- 8 much as having a camera set up to take advantage of
- 9 being able to see the entire room at once so they could
- see the general interaction. I felt like maybe the 10
- 11 personal cam might be a little bit too much or a little
- 12 logistically distracting, if you will. So I am leaning
- 13 towards more just one camera set up strategically in the
- 14 room where the entire meeting can be viewed and it will
- just run live for the whole session just like anybody 15
- sitting in front of their computer would. 16
- 17 CHMN. CHENAL: Now, if a Committee member asks a
- question, will their computer be open on them so they 18
- 19 will be, you know, they show up like that, or will it
- just be this static camera? 20
- 21 MR. SIMPSON: No, I think what we are leaning
- 22 towards is having anybody that's participating be in the
- 23 meeting live with their Zoom camera.
- 24 So what we are hoping to do is, people that
- attend the meeting in person, is we are probably going 25

- 1 to provide the laptops or pads for that. As a matter of
- 2 fact, that was of a discussion we had with High Country.
- They do have computer facilities that they can set up 3
- for us. But people who do it at home, obviously they 4
- are going to need to find their way into the meeting 5
- with their equipment because we don't have the ability 6
- to distribute it, but, again, through the Zoom 7
- 8 technology. We hope that that goes fairly seamlessly
- but, again, everybody should have a working camera and a 9
- working laptop in order to do that. 10
- 11 CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. Sounds good. Sounds good.
- 12 All right. Just a couple more things.
- 13 permit status, you have all the, Bert, you have all the
- 14 permits that are necessary other than the use permit, is
- 15 that correct? Other than the CEC, I mean to say.
- Correct. I defer to Susan on the 16 MR. ACKEN:
- 17 ASLD authorization for the solar array. For the gen-tie
- 18 that's correct.
- 19 MS. INNIS: That's correct.
- CHMN. CHENAL: All right. The only other 20
- 21 question was, you know, iPads and, you know, things like
- 22 I think that's something you guys are still
- 23 working out, you know, what, what the members will have
- 24 to participate in the Zoom meeting, as, Randy, you just
- said, so... 25

- MR. SIMPSON: Yeah. And we will circle back 1
- 2 with Susan and Bert on this, but we had a conversation
- with High Country late yesterday afternoon, and it did 3
- 4 look like they have done this in the past where they
- 5 have set these laptops up for other conferences.
- 6 know, the question there becomes how many. And I think
- they had a limited number. 7
- 8 So depending on how many Committee members we
- 9 have there and then how many participants we have in the
- hearing, you know, that's kind of a number that we need 10
- 11 to settle in to be certain we have enough. I think we
- 12 can make it work. But I also think we are going to need
- 13 to rely on some people bringing their own hardware, so,
- 14 if we get a last minute person that shows up and we
- 15 don't have enough, they are going to have to dial up on
- their own machine. 16
- 17 And I think, quite frankly, from our
- 18 perspective, like I would be happy, you know, and I am
- 19 sure Susan would be comfortable using her own computer.
- I don't think we need a dedicated computer. But for 20
- 21 people that, you know, are participants in the hearing,
- 22 Siting Committee members or other people perhaps, we
- 23 might want to do some setup on that and have a little
- 24 bit of control how that works so their computers are
- working functionally. 25

- CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. I think that's an item 1
- 2 that you guys still continue to work on and determine
- what the best solution is for it. I think most members 3
- 4 of the Committee have iPads. But, like I said, you may
- 5 want a different, you know, methodology to have control
- 6 over it, so...
- MR. SIMPSON: Yeah. I think our plan was to 7
- 8 have approximately at least eight, if not more,
- 9 computers set up at the facility that we can distribute
- 10 if somebody doesn't have a computer that has the right
- 11 hardware or has technical difficulties. It looks like
- 12 they can provide more. We just need to give them a
- number. But they had, they said they had eight 13
- 14 dedicated they could set up right now, no problem, with
- 15 nothing but this hearing material.
- 16 CHMN. CHENAL: So would it be helpful to know
- 17 which Committee members plan to attend in person and
- 18 what equipment they have?
- 19 MR. SIMPSON: Yeah. I believe that we should
- start doing some kind of inventory on participants and 20
- 21 whether they plan to attend.
- And the reason for that, Chairman, is it is 22
- 23 also, when we get the final facilities up and layout all
- 24 worked out, we also have to keep in mind we have a
- limited number of people who can attend in person. 25 So

- if that's 50, I feel like we need to allow at least 1
- 2 maybe 10 or so for people from the public that may show
- It could be up. We don't know who that may be. 3
- literally people from the project area or maybe even 4
- 5 somebody from Flagstaff that just is curious about the
- project. So I feel like we have got maybe between 6
- 7 Committee members and participants and, you know, all
- 8 the event coordinators that will be there, you know, we
- 9 probably only have, you know, between 10 and maybe
- 10 15 open slots there, if you will.
- 11 CHMN. CHENAL: We will have to make it work.
- 12 Might have to stagger people, might have them come back,
- 13 public come back, so...
- 14 MR. SIMPSON: Right now, on the Zoom platform,
- 15 which is what we are leaning on, Invenergy's license
- 16 agreement right now allows up to 100 people to
- 17 participate. I feel like that that's adequate.
- But, you know, this is one of those things, 18
- 19 again, where social media nowadays, if this got blasted
- out to the local social interest groups and, you know, 20
- 21 they hear solar project, who knows what we are going to
- get. So we are going to have to be cautious about how 22
- 23 we -- you know, again, priorities are going to have set
- 24 for participating parties and then others after that, I
- 25 think. And that's how we will be the gatekeeper. But I

- feel like a 100-person license gives us the flexibility 1
- 2 there.
- CHMN. CHENAL: Well, if people want to give 3
- comment on Monday night, and I am familiar with the 4
- gatekeeper, so if I wanted to make a comment and I tried 5
- 6 to log on, what -- and there were already too many, you
- know, we maxed out at the 100 limit, okay, between the 7
- 8 participants and, you know, everybody else and the
- 9 general public, and I called in, I guess I would receive
- a notice that I couldn't log in? Or would -- and how 10
- 11 would that work? I mean, call back later? If some
- 12 people had already given their comments and logged off,
- 13 then that would open some spots for other people to
- 14 join?
- 15 I don't know if my question makes any sense,
- 16 but...
- 17 MR. SIMPSON: I know what you are saying. And
- 18 that was kind of the one concern I had, is management of
- 19 So the -- it does allow for things like that to
- 20 be included. And we can set up, you know, a
- 21 conversation window that is in the sidebar. And so, you
- 22 know, people can read statements that are in there. And
- 23 we can have statements posted that says, you know, if
- 24 for some reason you can't log on, you know, please
- contact us this way and we will make sure we get you 25

- logged on, you know, whether that be a limited number of 1
- 2 licenses or some kind of technical difficulties.
- for example, if their video is not working or if they 3
- just can't get in, we can provide at least some way for 4
- 5 them to contact us so we can know that they want to give
- 6 the comment and make appropriate arrangements.
- CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. That sounds good. 7
- 8 And my question is not so much for this project.
- 9 I know there is a controversial, potentially
- controversial project in Tucson that's going to be heard 10
- 11 by us, and I think there will be that level of interest.
- 12 And I am curious how we would handle it. And you never
- know in this case, you just never know, like you said. 13
- 14 Okay. That sounds good. Some of this is just
- 15 going to have to be determined on the fly. And maybe we
- 16 are going to have to, during the course of the hearing,
- 17 provide notice of another time where we will
- specifically take public comment for overflow. 18
- 19 that's something like that we have to do, think of
- creative ways to handle it. 20
- 21 That's all I had. So let me ask if any of you
- 22 have any questions or concerns or things we should
- 23 discuss.
- 24 I will tell you right now I don't ever want to
- play poker with Susan or Brad. It is just -- I got a 25

- laugh out of you there. But you guys would be good 1
- 2 poker players because you don't give it away. It is a
- 3 compliment.
- 4 So anything else we should discuss?
- MR. ACKEN: Mr. Chairman, not from the 5
- 6 applicant's standpoint. Thank you.
- 7 CHMN. CHENAL: Linda, anything?
- MS. BENALLY: Thank you, Chairman. No, nothing 8
- 9 from APS at this point.
- 10 CHMN. CHENAL: Okay, good.
- 11 Antonio, any thoughts you have?
- 12 MR. ARIAS: Nothing really from Staff. I'll
- 13 just confirm the hearing days. Is it November 16th,
- 14 17th, and 18th?
- 15 CHMN. CHENAL: And we are going to put in the
- 19th as well. 16
- 17 MR. ARIAS: And the 19th as well. Okay. Thank
- 18 you. And nothing else.
- 19 CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. All right. Very good. So
- 20 I think, Antonio, you were going to just triple check,
- 21 although I can't imagine there was going to be a
- 22 problem, a single application for two CECs but for the
- 23 same applicant, there won't be a problem with that.
- MR. ARIAS: Yes, yes. I am going to confirm 24
- that right after this meeting. 25

- CHMN. CHENAL: Yeah. And you can cite to 1
- 2 Case 177. I think that's where that happened.
- MR. ARIAS: Okay, thank you. 3
- CHMN. CHENAL: Anything else? 4
- MS. COBB: Mr. Chairman, if everyone can just 5
- send me an email, that way I can send out the Zoom 6
- 7 notification for our prehearing conference on
- 8 November 10th. That way I have everyone's contact
- 9 information. I think I have most everyone's. But just,
- if everybody can send me an email, it is just Marie, 10
- 11 M-A-R-I-E, dot Cobb, C-O-B-B, at azag, like George, dot
- 12 gov. That way I can make sure everybody gets
- 13 notification.
- 14 I also wanted to mention I have taken a poll of
- 15 the Committee regarding their preferences whether to
- 16 attend in person or virtually. I am still waiting to
- 17 hear back from Member Gentles and Member Drago.
- I just sent them an email asking them for their 18
- 19 preference. But, with the exception of Mr. Villegas,
- everyone is preferring to attend in person. But Member 20
- 21 Villegas is not planning to attend this hearing anyway.
- 22 So, so far, we have -- one, two, three -- seven
- 23 Committee members that have indicated they will be
- 24 attending in person. I am just waiting on two
- additional ones. And I will update as soon as I have 25

- 1 those answers.
- 2 CHMN. CHENAL: Is Member Villegas not attending
- or is he just not attending live? 3
- 4 MS. COBB: He is not attending.
- CHMN. CHENAL: Okay.
- MS. COBB: He is not available that week. 6
- CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. So, Colette, is there 7
- 8 anything you -- any thoughts, recommendations you have
- 9 for us?
- 10 (An off-the-record discussion ensued.)
- 11 MR. SIMPSON: I did talk to the High Country
- 12 folks about that. And, you know, one of the things we
- 13 did tell them, the reason we wanted to bring in the
- 14 outside vendor was because of their familiarity with the
- 15 Committee. I think we are going to make that happen.
- 16 The other thing that he did mention, because we
- 17 know that when you have both an in-person sound system
- 18 running and everybody running on computers, you can get
- 19 feedback, and so there is concern about that, he said
- that they worked through that issue and that what they 20
- 21 intended to do is they will get the sound board hooked
- 22 up to the audio system that's actually in the conference
- 23 center, which is a fairly high-end system, fairly custom
- 24 system. And so everything will be piped through that
- common system. So you won't be running two speakers and 25

- two sets of microphones, you know. And that should be 1
- 2 resolved. And they worked through that recently in some
- 3 other events they have hosted.
- 4 Honestly, that was one of the things I was most
- concerned about, again, is compatibility between what 5
- 6 you are doing in person and what you are doing
- virtually. I talked to Men in Black about that. 7
- did say that, you know, one way to handle that is to, 8
- 9 the people attending in person would be required to wear
- headphones, because then you won't have any sound coming 10
- 11 back and feeding through two different systems. But
- 12 what the guy at High Country said, that if you do it
- 13 through their system, you get everything piped through
- 14 there, that should eliminate that problem. And so we
- 15 are probably going to go up there and do some testing in
- the next week or so to make sure that works. 16
- 17 And then he also asked if, if we wanted to have
- the event recorded. And I know in essence that's what 18
- you are doing. But they have, I quess, ways of 19
- recording the information as well. And I don't know if 20
- 21 that's something that you want to do or not.
- 22 CHMN. CHENAL: I don't think that's necessary.
- 23 I mean if someone wants to, but we don't do that.
- 24 have never done that. So I don't think --
- MR. SIMPSON: And that's kind of how I answered. 25

- 1 I don't think there was any legal reasons that we would
- 2 need to do that. And I said as long as the technology
- is working, the court reporter is the record. 3
- 4 know, obviously all the presentations audiovisual, that
- 5 will be submitted to Docket anyway, so...
- 6 CHMN. CHENAL: Right. We will be good with
- 7 that.
- 8 MR. SIMPSON: Okay.
- 9 CHMN. CHENAL: All right. So --
- MR. SIMPSON: Yeah, with that, too, so I am 10
- 11 going to provide them some comments back on the room
- 12 layout.
- And just for my knowledge, again, I am pretty 13
- 14 familiar with what you have been doing recently, and
- 15 having been a part of a number of these in the past, I
- 16 think I have a pretty good idea how to make it work, do
- 17 you want, Colette, do you want to be centered in the
- 18 middle of the horseshoe shape for your positioning?
- 19 believe that's where you have been in a lot of the cases
- 20 recently. Is that what your preference is?
- 21 THE REPORTER: Yes.
- 22 (An off-the-record discussion ensued.)
- 23 MR. SIMPSON: That's what I think I was going to
- 24 have them do, is kind of bend in one of the corners of
- the horseshoe shape that's closest to the screen. And 25

- 1 that would give you that exposure to the balance of the
- 2 horseshoe. Because we have these physical distancing
- requirements, it is going to, I think, allow us to do 3
- 4 that probably easier and give you more room so you can
- see the whole room. 5
- 6 THE REPORTER: Okay.
- MR. SIMPSON: And then, as far as the public 7
- 8 comment podium, Chairman, do you have a preference where
- 9 that is again? I think I was thinking probably the
- opposite corner of where Colette would sit. So, you 10
- 11 know, we would have a public comment essentially at each
- 12 corner of the screen, and then the court reporter at the
- 13 other corner, and then the horseshoe shape where all the
- 14 participants would be, you know, in a 270 degree kind of
- 15 configuration around that.
- CHMN. CHENAL: That's fine. 16
- 17 MR. SIMPSON: And then audience behind there.
- CHMN. CHENAL: I think that's fine. 18
- 19 MR. SIMPSON: Okay. What I will do then, I will
- have them redraft this drawing. There are a few things 20
- 21 that need to be changed on that. And then I will send
- 22 it to Bert. And he can work through you guys to get one
- 23 last look at it so you feel you are comfortable with
- 24 that before we go with it.
- 25 CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. All right. Anything else?

- 1 (No response.)
- 2 CHMN. CHENAL: All right.
- MR. ACKEN: No, thank you. 3
- 4 MS. COBB: Mr. Chairman, I have just one quick
- 5 question.
- On, I think it was Exhibit, I want to say -- it 6
- was the map with the signs. I think it was 3. Yes. 7
- 8 Has there been any thought to putting any signs along
- 9 I - 40?
- 10 MR. SIMPSON: We didn't, you know, we didn't
- 11 consider that directly. It is a -- it is interesting.
- 12 I-40, it is difficult to get off I-40 and get to the
- 13 project site. You have to take the off-ramp and then
- 14 double back through the area. So if you are not
- 15 familiar with it, if you are not somebody probably
- 16 local, I don't know that you are going to have an easy
- 17 time getting out there anyway.
- But the other thing with that is, when you get 18
- 19 off the interstate, immediately you go into some roads
- that are not in very good shape. So the public 20
- 21 accessibility is somewhat limited. I mean you do -- if
- 22 you go down the right road, you get a good road. If you
- 23 go down the wrong one, you get a really horrible one.
- So it would be difficult to do it there and actually do 24
- it in a way I think people would be able to react to it. 25

- CHMN. CHENAL: I don't think it is a good idea. 1
- 2 I just think, I know people slow down to see the sign to
- be able to read it. Going 75, 85 miles an hour, you are 3
- just asking for trouble. I just think the people that 4
- are going to Albuquerque could probably care less about 5
- it. It is the local people that are impacted. And they 6
- will see it on the way, the signage that you have got. 7
- 8 I think that's good enough.
- 9 And I don't know that we put signage on an
- interstate anyway. And getting the permission, the 10
- 11 right-of-way, I think that just -- I am concerned about,
- 12 yeah, I am just very concerned about that. I think the
- 13 signage is good.
- 14 Between the publications and the signage I think
- 15 people know about this project. I think the people that
- 16 will be impacted will know about it.
- 17 All right. I am almost afraid to ask. Is there
- anything else? 18
- 19 MS. COBB: No more.
- CHMN. CHENAL: Okay. Going once. Going twice. 20
- 21 All right. Thank you, everyone. We will see
- 22 you at the prehearing conference. And, again, if there
- 23 is something that comes up, you know, let us know. Ιf
- we have to get on another call, we can do it. 24
- 25 In the interim, we will be reviewing the notice

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of hearing on Monday. And I will be looking at the
1

    documents. We will be getting some documents out to you

    to look at. Okay?
